# 2. Summary of Status:

The Department of National Parks and Wildlife received the funds from the African Elephant Fund, through the Reserve Bank of Malawi, on the 29<sup>th</sup> of January, 2020.

The funds were a Grant to assist in the management of elephants and combating illegal trade in elephant products such as ivory through improved law enforcement by way of capacity building, provision of equipment, improved awareness and enhanced stakeholder collaboration.

# The main achievements are:

 Joint training workshop for investigators, prosecutors and border post officers. A Workshop was organized and conducted at Linde Hotel which included Prosecutors from the Department of National Parks and Wildlife (DNPW) and the Malawi Police Service (MPS), Investigation Officers from the DNPW and the MPS and mainstream law enforcement officers from Kasungu and Nyika National Parks and Vwaza Marsh Wildlife Reserve and other Protected Areas, as well as staff from key Border Posts. The Workshop facilitators were from the Wildlife Crimes Investigations Unit of the DNPW, Director of Prosecution from the Malawi Police Service, the Head of Investigation Unit at the Malawi Police Service, the Director of Investigations at the Financial Intelligence Authority (FIA) and the Chief Resident Magistrate for Central Malawi.

The workshop was very interactive and engaging and fruitful for all.

As one of the key outcomes, the participants formulated a networking platform through which they are sharing information and experiences in combating wildlife crime.

• Equip Law Enforcers at key points of entry and exit, Kasungu National Park, Vwaza Marsh Wildlife Reserve to assist in combating wildlife crime.

The Department, with financial support from the Project, has managed to procure assorted essential equipment and materials for law enforcement staff in the mentioned locations. These include tents, boots, socks, water bottles, field mats and sleeping bags.

These materials have greatly changed the working environment for these officers and they have been highly motivated.

• Develop and implement a well-targeted and evidence based awareness campaign.

Through the Project funding, the DNPW developed audio and video jingles that are running on Malawi's most popular TV and radio stations, including Zodiak Broadcasting Station (ZBS) and Timveni Radio. ZBS is an award-winning station that own a radio station as well as a TV station. Timveni on the other hand, is a popular Radio Station that broadcast live sports, mainly English Premier League Football matches which are a big crowd puller in the country.

To pass on messages of conservation, DNPW has used these to ensure a large percentage of the Malawian population is reached. These will be running for a period of six months, from the month of October (ZBS) and from November (Timveni Radio).

With the next portion of the funds, we intend to run this for another six months, as well as to produce posters and fliers on wildlife crime and illegal wildlife trade to be posted in strategic locations across the country.

#### **Main Challenges**

• The Covid 19 pandemic became very prevalent just after the funds had been received. Since most of the activities involved meetings and Workshops, implementation could not begin immediately, due to the various restrictions that were issued by the Government that included limiting public gatherings.

• One of the Workshops involves the Judiciary, who are crucial in the administration of justice in wildlife cases. This group of officials are regarded as crucial in the fight against wildlife crime.

Due to the backlog of cases within the Judiciary, resulting from the effects of the Presidential Election Case and the Covid 19 situation, the Judiciary were not available as planned, for the joint Workshop that we had requested them to take part in, both as participants as well as facilitators. Of crucial importance was the presence and authorization of Magistrates' participation by the Judiciary Chairperson of the Judicial Training Committee, Professor Kapindu. At the time of compiling this report, DNPW is still awaiting a feedback from the Judiciary on the request for Magistrates to participate and the Chairperson to preside of the Official Opening and closure of the Workshop.

This workshop finally took place from 11<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> May, 2021.
