Expected Accomplishment(s):

1. Field patrols intensified leading to increase in area coverage.

2. All wildlife offenders involved in illegal killing of elephants and wildlife trade successfully prosecuted and appropriately sanctioned.

3. The various training workshops to be organized would lead to enhanced capacity of 200 farmers in managing Human Elephant Conflicts.

4. The acquisition of requisite accoutrements and patrol equipment would enable the rangers carry out patrols and monitoring duties effectively and safely

5. Five (5) bill boards erected along prominent elephant corridors for awareness creation and public education.

6. Vulnerable crop fields identified, mapped out and effective deterrent measures put in place to mitigate crop losses and reduce revenge killing of marauding elephants.

Output(s):

1. Illegal killing of elephants and illegal trade in elephant products reduced (no elephant was killed in the Mole ecological landscape however two were killed in the RVV corridor)

2. 85% habitat of the Mole National Park secured and maintained through patrols

3. 250 farmers trained on the mitigation of Human-Elephant-Conflict

4. A five (5) member patrol team temporary stationed at the corridor

2. Summary of Status:

Brief description of the main achievements, main implementation challenges and lessons learned towards achieving SSFA's objective

The project was to help secure the Mole NP elephant population and its corridors through effective law enforcement in and around the park, in addition to enhanced community collaboration. The project produced the following achievements;

Implementation of the conservation of African elephants in Mole National Park and its corridors is on course. Below is the progress made thus far:

- 1. Equipment and logistics under the project have been procured and were given for use by staff (GPS, tents, food rations etc.). This helped enhance staff deployment and patrol coverage.
- 2. Farmers whose farms used to suffer severe elephant crop raids were trained and they are successfully applying the skills learnt which has been effective thus far.
- 3. Ranger patrols (Effort: effective Patrol-Man-days, and coverage) within MNP improved due to the availability of patrol logistics (food rations, fuel for deployment, GPS batteries).
- 4. A temporal patrol team was deployed from the MNP and stationed at the Red Volta Valley which enhanced the protection of migratory elephants in the corridor. Human elephant conflicts within the corridor have been reduced as a result. Destruction to farms have been minimal and no incidence of elephant and human casualty has been recorded within the Project implementation period.
- 5. Training of rangers has improved their effectiveness in patrols and law enforcement.

6.	Punitive sanctions are being preferred on elephant and wildlife crimes brought before the law courts. The support of wildlife prosecutors and judges of law courts is being felt following sensitization and advocacy sessions with them.
